 - a. Lionel Marez spoke about the City Controller's Zoom meeting on the budget that will be held on February 27, 2025 at 8:00PM. Done will be having a budget advocacy meeting on Zoom that will be held on March 6, 2025 from 6:00PM- 7:30PM with the Budget Advocates. www.budgetadvocates.org
 - b. Carol Dressden was concerned about a 102 unit, low-income, housing project with no parking four blocks from her house. She feels that the community should have been notified before this week. All the streets currently have all the parking taken up. Where are the cars going to park. There is also no plan for green or open space.
 - c. Kylee Pierce lives close to Moore Park and there is no parking. Moore Park is two lanes and with the Harvard Westlake project coming in, it will create traffic problems. She thinks no one that will live in the new project will use a bicycle as their primary form of transportation.

 - Motion A: The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council approves the Monthly Expenditure Report for <u>January 2025</u>
- b. Motion carried over from January meeting Jeff Hartwick
 - Motion A. The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests that Councilmembers Raman and Nazarian, and the Board of Fire Commissioners, support the successful LAFD Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program. The CERT program trains community volunteers in best practices and how to respond in the event of earthquakes and other disasters. CERT trained volunteers are prepared to help themselves, their neighbors, and their communities when an emergency happens, thus allowing the LAFD to concentrate their efforts in highest-need areas. CERT volunteers also consistently support the LAFD's responses to their routine activities. This is especially critical during emergencies. Some CERT trained volunteers can and do continue their training in hopes of joining the ranks of the Call Out teams that are especially important during emergencies. So far this year the CERT unit has conducted the following trainings: 2,357 CERT students; 2,700 Hands-Only CPR students and 961 Fire Extinguisher students. A total of 940 hours of service has been performed by the CERT Call Out volunteers. Considering that we never know when a city-wide emergency might occur, such as the recent destructive citywide wild fires, an investment in the CERT program will contribute immeasurably to the resilience and recovery of the city. The SCNC strongly urges city leaders to continue funding the important LAFD CERT program.

c. **Government Affairs Committee** – Barry Johnson

- i. Motion A: The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) supports Council File 25-0065 to instruct the City Attorney, in consultation with the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) and Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), to report back in 30 days with pathways to strengthen provisions within City ordinances and state laws governing fireworks, integrating ways that the City of Los Angeles can work to reduce the public safety risks associated with illegal fireworks and provide stronger deterrents against their use and sale. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to Council File 25-0065.
- ii. **Motion B:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) *opposes* Council File 25-0063, a City Council Resolution to support the South Coast Air Quality Management District's (AQMD) proposed Rules 1111 and 1121 to mandate zero-emission standards for residential and commercial furnaces and water heaters. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to Council File 25-0063.
- iii. **Motion C:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) *supports* Council File 24-1341 to instruct the Department of Building and Safety, with the assistance of the Planning Department, the Bureau of Engineering, in consultation with the City Attorney, to prepare a report with recommendations that explain the differences between a 'remodel'; 'major renovation'; and a 'demolition' project, and which reviews the existing practices and ordinances of other cities in Los Angeles County; and enforcement/compliance with the

existing provisions in Municipal Code Section 12.23 (Non-Conforming Building and Uses), which already requires that remodels maintain at least 50 percent of an original structure's footprint to maintain any non-conforming rights, improve notification requirements to neighbors, and review all applicable building loopholes in the City's Municipal Code (Zoning and Building Codes); and to clarify the setback regulations for non-conforming properties that qualify as 'remodels' or 'major renovations' instead of being classified as an entirely newly constructed property, and how this may impact property tax assessments and revenue to the City. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to Council File 24-1341.

iv. **Motion D:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) *supports* Council File 13-1493-S19 to instruct the Bureau of Street Services, in consultation with the City Attorney, to report back in 60 days with a set of objective health and safety standards, as required by California Government Code Sections 51036 through 51039, that can be utilized to assess appropriate locations for designation as a Restricted Vending Location; and that the City Council instruct the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) to provide an analysis of California cities, including the City of Inglewood, that have implemented time and place restrictions for street vending in compliance with California Government Code Sections 51036 through 51039. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to Council File 13-1493-S19.

- i. Motion A: The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests Councilmember Nithya Raman and the Los Angeles Department of Transportation to add the following streets to existing Preferential Parking District (PPD) # 51:
 - 1. Radford Avenue L.A. River to Moorpark Street
 - 2. Gentry Avenue Valleyheart Drive N. to Moorpark Street Ben Avenue Valleyheart Drive N. to Moorpark Street Agnes Avenue Valleyheart Drive N. to Moorpark Street Vantage Avenue Valleyheart Drive N. to Moorpark Street

- ii. Motion B: The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) to change the sequence and length of the traffic signal at the 101 Southbound and Northbound, On and Off Ramps, at Laurel Canyon Boulevard, to relieve the back up of traffic turning into and out of the 101 overpass by Campbell Hall School, especially during school drop off/pick up times when the turning lanes become blocked with parents and students going in/out from the school.
- iii. **Motion C:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) to extend the length of time for the left turn arrows at Moorpark Street and Laurel Canyon Boulevard, therefore relieving the long back up of left turning traffic (Northbound and Southbound, Eastbound and Westbound) that due to a short left-turn lane and long lines of traffic make for long

- wait times and blocks traffic going straight ahead further behind the turn lane.
- iv. **Motion D:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) to study extending the right turn only lane heading SB from the 101 SB off ramp from Campbell Hall (into the school only) to the intersection of Moorpark Street (without losing any street parking). Cars use the Campbell Hall turn lane to go around traffic in the non-official curb lane, often causing traffic issues when trying to get back into backed up traffic going south on Laurel Canyon Boulevard.
- v. **Motion E:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) supports Greater Toluca Lake Neighborhood Council's (GTLNC) Resolution opposing reducing Forest Lawn Drive's four motor vehicle lanes to two motor vehicle lanes.

e. Public Safety Committee – Jeff Hartwick

- Motion A. The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests that Councilmembers Raman and Nazarian introduce a motion before the City Council for an ordinance making ss called "warming fires" illegal under the Los Angeles Municipal Code. In recent weeks, the Palisades and other local fires have devastated Los Angeles. Despite this crisis, homeless individuals have set, and continue to set, illegal fires in Studio City in areas with dry vegetation. These unauthorized and unpermitted fires threaten residential and commercial buildings. The Fire Code currently prohibits any open burning when atmospheric conditions or local circumstance make such fires hazardous (Fire Code Section 307.1.1). Recreational fires are also prohibited within 25 feet of a structure or combustible material (Fire Code Section 307.4.2), which essentially encompasses all homeless encampments. Our dry winter and fire emergency obviously make warming fires in homeless encampments unlawful. There are local reports that LAFD will not respond to "warming fires" unless they spread or are out of control. This is unacceptable in light of the current fire crisis. A warming fire could easily get out of control with dry vegetation near homeless encampments and endanger nearby structures. Unpermitted warming and recreational fires must be classified as misdemeanor violations and prohibited so that our communities can be safe from conflagrations that have destroyed other parts of our city.
- Motion B. The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) opposes ii. Council File 23-0243: Title, Federal Immigration Enforcement / City Resources, Property, Personnel / Prohibit Use /Compliance Monitoring Report. This motion authorized an ordinance that prohibits the City from (1) investigating, citing, arresting, holding, transferring, or detaining any person for immigration enforcement; (2) providing any immigration agent access to non-public areas of jails; (3) permitting immigration agents from interviewing persons in custody for immigration enforcement; or (4) participating in any joint task force with federal immigration agents. The ordinance basically shields illegal immigrants in City jails from being questioned or subject to arrest by federal law enforcement, or of notifying ICE agents about the release of violent immigrant criminals who are subject to deportation orders. The result is that thousands of criminal aliens are released into our neighborhoods, free to commit more crimes. This endangers the public. Federal law enforcement should be allowed full access to LA jails and be able to interview suspects. The City Council should oppose this ordinance instead of aiding and abetting the harboring of illegal immigrants. This motion is also to be

- submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to <u>Council File</u> <u>23-0243</u>. <u>Ordinance:</u>
- iii. **Motion C.** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) supports Council File 25-0006-S17: Title, Special Motion 17 / Low Water Pressure / Dry Hydrants / Santa Ynez Reservoir / 2025 Windstorm and Wildfire Recovery. During the apocalyptic Palisades fire, there were reports of low water pressure and dry fire hydrants. The nearby Santa Ynez reservoir containing 117 million gallons of water was also empty. An investigation should be conducted to examine why there were water supply problems and to what extent they had an effect on the firefighting effort. This motion supports an analysis and report on these water issues. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) Council File 25-0006-S17
- iv. **Motion D.** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) supports Council File 25-0006-S1: Title, Special Motion 1 / After Action Report / City and County Emergency Response /Procurement / 2025 Windstorm and Wildfire Recovery. The terrible recent wildfires resulted in fatalities, the destruction of thousands of structures, and the displacement of Angelenos who no longer have homes. To better prepare for future wildfires and to hold our city leaders accountable, an after-action report is necessary. This motion supports an independent report on the City's emergency response to the January 2025 wildfires. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to Council File 25-0006-S1.
- v. **Motion E.** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) supports Council File 25-006-S36: Title, Los Angeles Water and Power Fire Preparedness / Human Activity / Climate Change / 2025 Windstorm and Wildfire Recovery. The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) updates a Wildfire Mitigation Plan (WMP) every three years, the 2024 WMP plan being the latest. This plan includes extensive risk assessment measures, and considers factors like topography, vegetation, and climate conditions. The plan also requires community engagement with stakeholders. But after the recent wildfire destruction exposed problems like lack of funding and readiness, the 2024 plan must be revisited. This motion requires the LADWP, in conjunction with the LAFD, to make recommendations related to the City's response and fire preparedness and evaluate successes and shortcomings. This motion is also to be submitted as a Community Impact Statement (CIS) to Council File 25-0006-S36.

- 21. **Motion B:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) to change the sequence and length of the traffic signal at the 101 Southbound and Northbound, On and Off Ramps, at Laurel Canyon Boulevard, to relieve the back up of traffic turning into and out of the 101 overpass by Campbell Hall School, especially during school drop off/pick up times when the turning lanes become blocked with parents and students going in/out from the school.
- 22. **Motion C:** The Board of the Studio City Neighborhood Council (SCNC) requests the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) to extend the length of time for the left turn arrows at Moorpark Street and Laurel Canyon Boulevard, therefore relieving the long back up of left turning traffic (Northbound and Southbound, Eastbound and Westbound) that due to a short left-turn lane

Radford Studio Center Audience Shows and Events Policies

To attend an audience, show, event, or public meeting at Radford Studio Center, the following items are required:

- Valid Government issued Driver's license if you are driving a vehicle onto the lot.
- Valid Government issued Identification card if you are walking onto the lot. A Military ID and Passport ID will suffice.
- An adult must accompany minors (17 years old and younger). Student ID cards are preferred for those who have them.

The following items are prohibited on your person while attending an audience show, event, or public meeting on Radford Studio Center property:

- Knives
- Mace/pepper Spray
- Sharp Objects
- Firearms
- Alcoholic beverages
- Drugs (including marijuana for medicinal purposes)

All guests are subject to security screening and search. Guests will be required to pass through a metal detector or screened using a hand-held metal detector.

- Once the audience member has emptied their pockets and turned over any prohibited items, the audience member will be instructed to proceed through the metal detector or screened using a hand-held metal detector.
- Should the audience member activate the metal detector, the person will be asked to step to the side
 and will be scanned (entire body length front and backside) by the Security Officer with the hand-held
 metal detector.
- The audience member will not be allowed into the Studio until the Security Officer is satisfied that the individual has nothing on his/her person that constitutes a danger to others.
- Should the guest refuse to be screened, they are subject to being denied access to Radford Studio Center property.
- NO FIREARMS OF ANY KIND ARE ALLOWED INSIDE THE STUDIO. Security Officers who
 detect that a guest is in possession of a firearm should notify the Security Supervisor and P.O.
 IMMEDIATELY.
- Off-duty Law Enforcement in possession of a firearm will be instructed to either return the weapon to their vehicle or turn it over to Security where it will be kept, UNLOADED, in a SAFE, located in the security manager's office.
- Any props or toys that resemble weapons in any way are to be denied or confiscated. This includes props / accompanying costumes.

Each guest/audience member will be required to submit a form of identification which will be tagged with an item that is confiscated and held with security. Guests and audience members will be instructed to pick up their confiscated items at the first (1st) level of the Sater parking structure near the elevators at the completion of the event. No personal pets are allowed at any time on the Studio lot.

If, at any time, an audience member or guest, wanders away from their event or meeting space, into an unauthorized area, that person is subject to immediate dismissal from the lot.
